On Saturday, August 16, 2014, Flagler Beach will be hosting the Annual Surfers for Autism event. As usual, they are looking for volunteers to assist during the event. EAC will be sending out a sign up sheet to see if we could get a team of volunteers for this event. Here are some questions and answers for first time volunteers:

**What can I expect the day of the event?** You will go to registration and check in – turn in your waiver and receive a wristband. If you are under the age of 18, your waiver **MUST BE NOTARIZED** or you will not be allowed to volunteer. **What time should I arrive?** There is a mandatory volunteer meeting at 8:00 am but you may arrive earlier to help set up or assist resources in set up. **How late does it last?** We surf until 4:00 pm. You may stay later and help us break down. **What if I don't surf?** You do not need to know how to surf to be able to volunteer. The majority of volunteers needed will be in the water but inexperienced volunteers will be at the water line or may assume duties in the activity tent or food tent. **Do I have to stay all day?** We do ask that you make it a full day commitment. **Do I get a t-shirt?** We cannot offer t-shirts to all the volunteers for free but we do offer you a discount on the event shirts. **Will there be food?** We will provide lunch and water all day. Bring anything additional you would like. **What do I need to bring and will there be a place to put it?** A towel, sandals (the sand gets hot) and a smile! 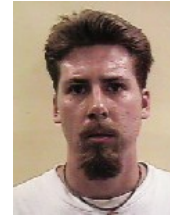

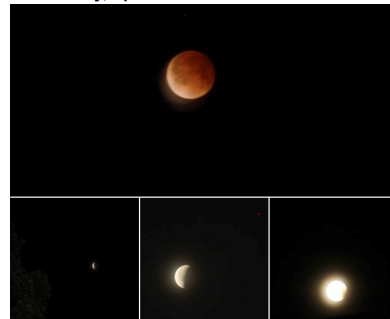

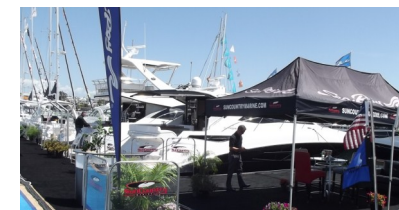
## California Boat Show -Dexter Howe

Recently Sea Ray/Meridian Palm Coast received a request to assist our dealer, Sun Country Marine, in Dana Point California in preparing for a large boat show in Newport California. Mike Soard, Tracey Stilwell, Steve Chambers and Dexter Howe went to assist with the set up and delivery of the boats to the show.

We arrived in California on 3/28/2014 and we assisted with the buildup of the 441SB, 391SB and our new model 510FLY. This being the first 510FLY that went to the west coast of the United States, the boat generated a lot of attention and excitement as it came together.

After our initial assemble at the Shipyard we moved the boats to a public dock where we could complete the assembly process and clean the boats for the show. While we were completing the assembly we were constantly being asked about the boat, it generated a lot of interest and compliments from passer bys, several of which contacted the dealer to inquire about the new 510FLY.

March 31<sup>st</sup> we moved 8 Sea Ray and Meridian models, (370SDA, 410DA, 470DA, 510DA, 510FLY 540DA, 391SB, 441SB) to the show in Newport, CA.



The boats were docked secured and the interior decorators went to work making the final setup for the show. All the while people were walking the dock and stopping by to look at the Sea Ray/Meridian product. Again many people were looking at the new 510FLY wanting more information about the new model that had not yet been debuted on the west coast. As expected the show brought much attention to the Sea Ray / Meridian brand. As a result of the outstanding product, Sun Country Marine sold the following vessels during the event: 510DA, 441SB, 350DA and 310DA. The 510FLY had already been sold before the show started. Thanks to Greg Glogow, Dustin Hastings and all of the people at Sun Country Marine as well as the team at Palm Coast that made this show a success.

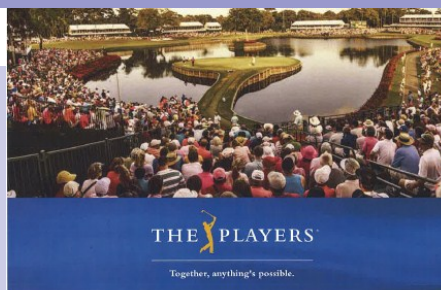
