If you do not complete BOTH of these activities you will default to the Core Health Plan and have a much higher deductible in 2015.

Everyone knows that air conditioning is a must have, especially in Florida.

The average homeowner spends about \$375 a year on air conditioning. Here's how to slash your summer energy bills without sacrificing too much comfort.

1. Don't just set it and forget it.

If you have central air controlled by a thermostat, use a programmable thermostat to save energy by turning the desired temperature up during the day when no one is home. You can give up a couple degrees at night especially on the hottest days. You may be surprised to find that the difference between outdoor and indoor temperatures matters as much as the absolute temperature inside your home.

2. Clean the air filter.

Whether you have central air or a window unit, a dirty filter will reduce your AC's efficiency, making it use more energy. Check your system's air filter monthly and expect to change the filter every three months.

3. Get an annual checkup.

If you have central air, bring in a pro to check it out — once per year should cover both the heating and the cooling season. A professional should be able to diagnose any inefficiencies before you've wasted money on monthly heating and cooling bills.

4. Think small.

Cooling one room with a window air conditioning unit requires much less energy (and investment) than a whole central air system for your house. Ask yourself how you'll use your new air conditioner, and choose the smallest option that works.

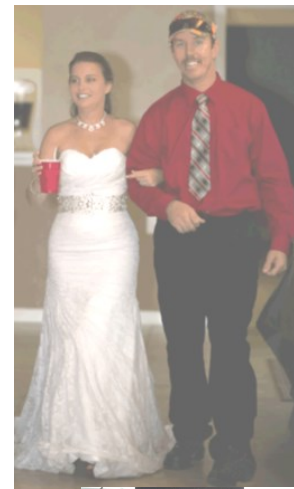

Church Mission

This past shutdown at Sea Ray, I decided to spend my time off in Antigua Guatemala. Many would picture the beautiful city as a vacation, but my intentions were different. I spent 7 days, along with 13 other members of Epic church, on a mission trip in the surrounding areas of Antigua. Epic Church has spent the past six years investing into the community half way across the World. In this time we have built 10 homes and have helped send 8 children to school while doing other projects to help out the local churches and schools in the area.

On this trip in particular we started out the week by building 2 homes for homeless families in a neighboring community of Pastores, Sacatepequez, Guatemala. When I say a home I am referring to a 12 by 14 ft. aluminum shed. This is an upgrade from the cornstalk and dirt floor house they previously lived in. The following day we went to an orphanage for abused children and we sealed up a leaking roof and painted a large portion of the building. The next project we did involve working at a local feeding center for children. At this facility, they feed approximately 600 children two times a week. For a majority of the children this is the only meals they will receive all week that doesn't include coffee and stale bread. The work was tough but knowing that it helped enrich the lives of others was rewarding in itself. The final day that we were there, we decided to take a small trip. We hiked up an active volcano, which took about 2 hours, and roasted marshmallows in a lava pit. It was a great way to end a tough week.

A lot of people ask why do we go to another country to help others when we have so many people in need in Flagler County. My response is "I go there to change my perception". We tend to get caught up in the business in life, work and society and lose focus on what is going on around us. Something changes inside you when you see the poverty in other countries and the lack of influence from the government. It makes you want to come back and make a change here and get involved, which we do. There are many opportunities to serve others in Flagler County like food pantries, Habitat builds, plus the local schools. So it doesn't stop in Antigua, it just helps us refocus to helping Flagler County.

When filling out the form, make sure to have all your information with your issue and your solution written on the form. Review these questions in your head when filling out a form: What is my issue? Sample answer-The Aft Strm Curtain P0147 Print 10-14-1154 is 3" too short. Is this the only vessel or area with this issue? Sample answer-This issue is on 450DA, 470DA, 650DA. What is the best way to fix this issue? Sample answer- Please add 3" to the Aft Strm Curtain P0147 Print 10-14-1154. Make sure to have prints (marked with changes looking for), drawing, etc. attached, so if it goes to Engineering and gets assigned an EAF, the Engineer does not have to waste time looking for you, they can start working on the suggestion instead. Part changes must be more than 1". If it is a Safety suggestion, run it past Chuck Johnson or Cornelious Friendly for safety approval. If you are stuck trying to write up a suggestion, please feel free to sit in on a PACE meeting and we can assist. We will not write it for you but assist best we can. PACE Points are used for your review and your bonus.

HERB GRILLED CHICKEN WINGS

Ingredients:
4 garlic cloves, finely chopped
1/4 cup chopped fresh oregano
1/4 cup chopped fresh rosemary
1/4 cup olive oil

Kosher salt, freshly ground pepper
2 pounds chicken wings

Preparation: Combine garlic, oregano, rosemary, and oil in a large re-sealable plastic bag, season with salt and pepper Add chicken wings, seal bag and turn to coat. Chill at least 1 hour or overnight. Prepare grill for medium heat. Remove wings from marinade and grill, covered and turning occasionally, until golden brown and crisp. 15-20 minutes

On October 14 through October 16, 2014 we will have an ABS Auditor here for our annual ISO Audit. If you are not familiar with this event, it is when we get recertified for ISO Certification, which is what establishes our QMS system. Basically the auditor makes sure we are following the procedures we wrote, such as work instructions, job descriptions, prints, calibration, etc. If we are not following procedures, we will get a finding. We then establish if the finding will be an action item or a C.A.R. Our facility strives for no findings during this event.

The ABS Auditor can walk up and audit anyone he feels like, so be sure you know the answer otherwise request help from your supervisor or QMS Coordinator Robin Peterson.

As a reminder each employee is given a card to go with your time card during orientation that has our Quality Policy and Quality Objective on it. You may read directly from the card during the audit.
